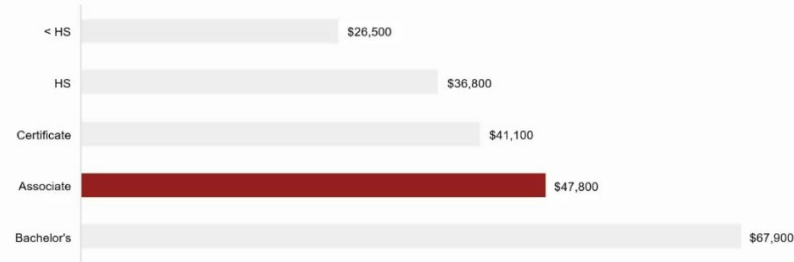

THE FINANCIAL AID PROCESS
Finding funding for college can be a complex process. Here's a guide to help you understand the steps involved in applying for financial aid. The U.S. Department of Education's Free Application for Student Aid is the first step you'll take in the process you'll follow to pay for your education.

PREPARATION
Start by creating a plan. Make sure you have all the information you need to apply for aid. This includes your income, assets, and other financial information. Many colleges have college funding programs, but a general number or your college financial aid office for more information.

FAFSA*
The FAFSA is the Free Application for Student Aid. It's the first step in the process of applying for financial aid. You'll need to provide information about your income, assets, and other financial information. You'll also need to provide your school's FAFSA ID. After you submit your FAFSA, you'll receive your Student Aid Report (SAR). You'll need to review your SAR for accuracy and make any necessary corrections.

TYPES OF FEDERAL STUDENT AID
There are four main types of federal student aid: grants, loans, work-study, and scholarships. Grants are the most common type of aid and are awarded based on financial need. Loans are borrowed money that you'll need to repay. Work-study is a program that allows you to earn money to help pay for your education. Scholarships are awarded based on merit or other criteria.

AWARD
Once you've completed the FAFSA process, you'll receive an award letter from your school. This letter will tell you how much aid you're eligible for and what types of aid you can receive. You'll need to accept the aid and complete any necessary paperwork.

COLLEGE
Once you've received your award letter, you'll need to complete any necessary paperwork and enroll in college. You'll also need to make sure you're meeting the requirements for the aid you've received.

BEYOND EDUCATION
WORKFORCE
If you're interested in the workforce, you may want to consider a career training program. These programs can help you gain the skills and experience you need to succeed in your chosen field.

REPAYMENT
If you've received a loan, you'll need to make sure you're meeting the repayment requirements. You'll need to make sure you're making your payments on time and for the full amount.

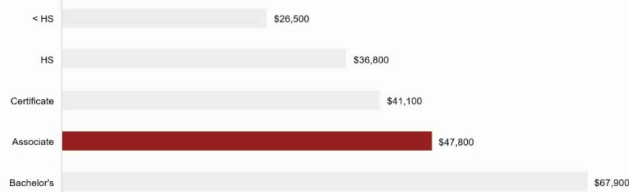
