Welcome to the 2021-2022 school year! Wonderful news for you: The USDA has extended Free Breakfast and Lunches thru June 30, 2022! Every student is eligible for free meals.

Breakfast will be served in each building

- In the Elementary, the students will be offered breakfast in their classrooms soon after school begins.
- **Middle** and **High School** students go to their building kitchens as they get off the bus and eat in the cafeteria.

Lunch

- Ala Carte will be available, as usual in the Middle and High school during lunch times.
- If your child packs his/her lunch, milk will be offered for .50 cents.
- If you are an Ida Virtual Academy student, meal pickup can be arranged with Mrs. Oberski.

If a doctor has determined that your child has a disability, and the disability would prevent the participant from eating the regular school meals, we will make reasonable substitutions to the meals for students who are considered to have a disability or medical need that restricts their diet. This is done on a case-by-case basis. A doctor's statement, including prescribed diet and/or substitution, must be submitted to the food service department of the school. The Dietary/Allergy form may be obtained by the school website, school offices or the Food service dept.

We will provide building lunch menus as usual. These can be found on the school website under the specified building. Elementary breakfast menu will also be provided. There is a Nationwide food chain supply issue. There may have to be menu changes that are out of our control, due to product shortages. Please be patient as we will do our best to provide the best for our students...which is a yummy and healthy meal.

We look forward to a great school year here at Ida Public Schools.


Student Achievement

tudents and teachers worked very hard this past year to achieve and maintain gains in the classroom. One tool that was used to measure student growth and progress was the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) assessment. This test was given to our elementary students at the beginning, middle, and end of the year, and to our middle school students at the beginning and end of the year.

We are all looking forward to having a great year and cannot wait to see the successes our students will make this year!

At the beginning of the year some of our grade levels as a whole did not meet the national norm by one to two points for the reading and/or math assessments. This was expected due to the spring school closure in 2020. However, by the end of the year, this gap closed and 90% of our grade levels scored at or above the suggested national average. This is outstanding and speaks volumes for how hard our students, teachers, and families worked both in and out of school this past year!

Many of our students also took the state standardized M-Step, PSAT, and/ or SAT assessment this past spring. In a non-pandemic year, part of a school rating assigned from the state of Michigan is based on the amount of students who take these state provided assessments. This threshold is set at 95%, which we generally meet or exceed. During the 2021 state spring testing window we had an overall average of 94% of our students



participate on these assessments including our virtual academy students. This also takes into account any student that was quarantined and unable to test. Final score reports from these tests have not been released yet, but they should be coming out soon. We are eager to see how well our students did and also see areas of weakness that we can improve and focus on for the upcoming school year. Looking ahead to the 2021-2022 school year, Ida Public Schools plans to continue providing students with high quality in person instruction. We will also continue reading and math intervention and after school tutoring services that are designed to meet student needs. Student enrichment activities such as Quiz Bowl and Math Counts will also be continued.



American's Farmers Grow Communities Grant



WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT?

Our community will have the opportunity to vote on an Ida Public Schools bond proposal on the November 2, 2021 election ballot. If approved, it would provide \$38,800,000 for building & site improvements to address identified and ongoing facility needs based on facility assessments and community input. If approved by voters, the 2021 bond millage would increase the milage rate by 4.70 mills.

Tax Relief Options for Voters

Michigan Homestead Property Tax Credit – Households that pay homestead property taxes greater than 3.2% of their annual income may be eligible for Michigan's Homestead Property Tax Credit. Eligible households may deduct up to 60% (up to 100% for senior citizens, please see the senior credit table below) of the millage increase cost up to a \$1,500 Homestead Tax Credit limit. The eligibility for the credit begins to decrease after household income exceeds \$51,001 and ends completely after the household income exceeds \$60,001.


