The school starting and dismissal times remain the same as last year. On a regular day, elementary classes will begin at 7:55 a.m. and end at 3:00 p.m. Middle school and high school students will attend from 8:05 a.m. to 3:10 p.m.

Athletic Event Yearlong Passes Available

Yearlong passes will be available from the high school office. Family passes (parents and children 21 and younger) will be \$200.00, individual adult passes are \$90.00, and student passes are \$50.00. Available again this year are senior citizen passes. They are \$10 and are for senior citizens living in the district or senior citizens who have grandchildren attending Ida. These passes will admit the holder to all home sporting events for the entire school year. Individual game tickets will remain the same at \$5.00 for adults and \$4.00 for students, with children (4th grade and younger) being admitted free. For freshman-only and middle school contests, adults are \$4.00 and children are \$3.00.

The Carsten Connection

The members of the Ida Board of Education and administration have examined the results of the long-term facility study conducted by Kohler Architecture for Ida Public Schools and determined that we must move forward with a Bond Initiative to construct a new building. It will be necessary to construct a new building which can house at least 600 students therefore replacing the elementary school which was built in 1951. Additionally, bond funds will also be needed to renovate the current high school and middle school to extend the lifespan of those buildings. The Board of Education has already secured the services of Plante Moran CRESA who will serve as the owner's representative as well as Kingscott who will provide architectural and engineering services



throughout the entire project. The Bond Construction team will be completed in August after the Board of Education determines the construction manager and financial representative to be used. There is a Town Hall Meeting to discuss the construction bond project scheduled for Tuesday, September 11, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. Please join us in the high school cafeteria to discuss the district needs and provide input for the Board of Education. One major decision that will be discussed are the pros and cons of building a high school or elementary school.

I am concerned about the upcoming ballot proposal in Michigan to legalize marijuana. The negative effects of marijuana affect the developing brain in young adults up to about age 25. The THC levels in marijuana have increased dramatically. In 1983 the average THC level was under 4% while in 2012 it has risen to almost 13%. The THC is deposited in the cell wall of the brain and it thickens the cell wall up to 400 times. The THC damages the developing brain while also causing side effects such as: lack of ambition, increased appetite, perception of time altered, paranoid state, vivid hallucinations, depersonalization and interested only in immediate gratification. All of these attributes are very dangerous for kids and will certainly inhibit success in all aspects of life. As of 2017 twenty-nine states have legalized marijuana for medical purposes while ten have approved recreational use of the drug. The State of Colorado legalized recreational use several years ago so it serves as a good example to learn from. It has been very detrimental to the quality of life for their residents. The potency levels in marijuana have skyrocketed up to over 25% in Colorado. Marijuana is sold in edibles such as milk chocolate, beef jerky, hot sauces, honey, crackers, vape pens, candy and even drinks. The problem for the consumer is that these products mimic the regular items so it is easy to mistakenly consume them. Even more disturbing is that the products are marketed toward young kids. Two deaths in Denver have been attributed to recreational marijuana use. For the sake of our great state, the quality of life for our residents and the imminent danger marijuana poses to our youth please vote no on legalizing marijuana in November!



STOP THE SILENCE HELP END THE VIOLENCE



A hero doesn't necessarily have to wear a cape and tights, maybe a hero speaks up for what's right. Maybe that hero could be you. If you see or hear something that doesn't seem right, you can submit a confidential tip to OK2SAY. OK2SAY allows anyone to confidentially report tips on criminal activities or potential harm directed at Michigan students, school employees, or schools.

A Secret Service study found that in 81% of violent school incidents, someone other than the attacker had knowledge of the plan, but failed to report it because of fear or retaliation or being labeled a snitch. To eliminate that fear and help break the code of silence, the tipster's idenity is confidential.

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Protect yourself and others by using OK2SAY. Because if you won't, who will?

DISTRICT MEDICATION POLICY



Many students are required to take medications (prescriptions and/or non-prescription) during the school day. There are specific policies adopted by the Ida Board of Education and the state that must be followed in these cases.

- All medications must be brought to the office by a parent and dispensed by the office staff only.
- Students are not allowed to have medications in their possession (to include lockers) or take medications without the supervision of the office staff.
- The medication must be in its original container and be accompanied by written instructions from the student's physician and parent. The required form for providing this information is available in the office.



Bus pickup times are the same as last year. Students are advised to be at their bus stop 3-5 minutes early.

Reminders for Students.

- Be courteous and cooperative with your driver
- Treat other passengers with respect

Parents, please teach your student the following safety tips: Waiting for the Bus:

- Stay a safe distance from the roadway
- No pushing or horseplay
- Stay away from the wheels

Crossing in front of the bus.

- Stop at the edge of the bus
- look right and left
- look at the driver for a signal to cross
- keep watching for traffic as you walk

WHOLE APPLE AWARD



The Whole Apple Award Banquet is an annual banquet to honor and recognize staff, students, and community members who have a positive impact on students with disabilities. Each year the committee seeks nominations from educators and other community members of Monroe County. This is a wonderful opportunity to honor and celebrate individuals for their commitment, education, and inclusion of individuals with special needs in our schools and community. There are thirteen different award categories included in the Whole Apple Award. The General Education Peer Mentor of the Year was awarded to Ida High School senior Austin Bean. Austin was part of our Links - Peer to Peer program, he was nominated by his Links for this award and they attended the banquet with him when he received the award. Below are some excerpts from his speech at the banquet.

"I'm a senior from Ida High School. My Links this year were Dante and Evan. They were great kids and I loved going to their classroom every day. When I decided to take Links as a class I wondered to myself, if this was going to be the right fit for me. Before we found out who our Links were I was nervous because I've never worked with someone who is autistic before and I didn't know what to expect. When I found out I had not only one, but two Links I was super nervous and didn't know what to think. I went home that night and I developed a plan. I sat in my chair and thought. There's no need to be nervous I know autism is nothing Dante and Evan can control. So I told myself. I'm going to meet them with a mindset I would anybody else. That's exactly what I did. When I first introduced myself I already had Dante and Evan laughing and we were all making jokes back and forth and all the nerves went away. After that point I learned what they liked and what their hobbies were and I'd have conversations with them about what they enjoyed. It was always funny because when Dante would be talking Evan would want to tell me something too and they'd always argue who's turn it was or who's story was better. The thing I loved about Dante and Evan is no matter how bad of a mood they were in or how bad of a day they were having they'd always smile when they saw me and they'd be ready to work. They always tried their hardest and made sure the job was done. Over the course of the semester our friendship with each other became very strong and I started looking at Dante and Evan as if they were my best friends. They taught me a lot of things, such as Evan's favorite cartoon character Monkey De Lupo, and Ben 10. Dante taught me various types of card games such as Skip-Bo, Skip-Bo Trash which I've even taught my friends how to play. See the thing is, no matter what task life throws at you, you have to tackle it with the right mindset. When I won "Peer-to-Peer Program Regular Education Student of the Year" for being a Link I was just completely blown away. I was honestly in shock. All of my friends were congratulating me and asking me how I did it. I tell them exactly what I told you guys here today. You shouldn't look at someone different because they're not the same as you. Instead you should try and just talk to them and maybe you'll start friendships you thought you'd never have just like I did. I loved every bit of working with Dante and Evan and they are some fine young men who will do great things later in life. I'd encourage everyone to tell their kids they should be a part of a Peer-to-Peer program like Links."

Free and Reduced Meal Price Applications

An application for free/reduced meals is avail-

able at each of the building offices or you may print the application from the Ida Public Schools website. PLEASE return the form prior to the first day of school by dropping the application off at a building office or at the Superintendent's office. The applications will be processed in advance so that your children will receive the benefits on the first day of school.

You can deposit money into your child's account by sending cash or a check, made payable to Ida Public Schools, with your student to school. You may send one check to be distributed amongst siblings, but please note how much money should be given to each child. You can also log into MySchoolBucks from the Ida Public Schools website. This allows you to make deposits to your child's account and view their account history.

Please make sure your child has money on their lunch account. The food service staff will only allow students to "charge" a lunch one time. Then your child is notified that they need to make a deposit to their account.

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Through the course of last school year Ida Public Schools has used a \$71,000 grant from the State of Michigan's Talent and Economic Development department to support our Career and Technical Education Programs. State Senator Dale Zorn was instrumental in helping our staff acquire the grant which will allow us to update our equipment to meet current industry standards in the following programs: drafting, computer aided design, welding, metals, and woods. NEW TECHNOLOGY AT IDA



Next fall we will be seeing some new and innovative technology at use in our class-rooms. We have purchased Ozobots, Dash Robots, and Bloxels. These are mini programmable devices to help students learn basic programming. We have also added some high tech cameras and microscope projector cameras. For our high school math department we purchased Kuta software. This software creates exactly the worksheet you may need in a matter of minutes to reteach or review an area of need.

For the district, we installed a new storage server and network, updated additional fiber network between the schools, purchased new computers for the CAD (Computer Aided Design) lab and the high school media center. The elementary is getting an additional Chromebook cart and the middle school will be getting two additional carts. Several interactive whiteboards will be updated in each building.

Finally, we migrated our email to office 365 so it will be easier than ever to contact us. Just check out our recently updated website!
