The school starting and dismissal times remain the same as last year. On a regular day, elementary classes will begin at 7:55 a.m. and end at 3:00 p.m. Middle school and high school students will attend from 8:05 a.m. to 3:10 p.m.

Athletic Event Yearlong Passes Available

Yearlong passes will be available from the high school office. Family passes (parents and children 21 and younger) will be \$200.00, individual adult passes are \$90.00, and student passes are \$50.00. Available again this year are senior citizen passes. They are \$10 and are for senior citizens living in the district or senior citizens who have grandchildren attending Ida. These passes will admit the holder to all home sporting events for the entire school year. Individual game tickets will remain the same at \$5.00 for adults and \$4.00 for students, with children (4th grade and younger) being admitted free. For freshman-only and middle school contests, adults are \$4.00 and children are \$3.00.


No time for Breakfast at home?


Breakfast is served in all cafeterias: 7:45 a.m. – 8:00 a.m.

STOP THE SILENCE HELP END THE VIOLENCE



A hero doesn't necessarily have to wear a cape and tights, maybe a hero speaks up for what's right. Maybe that hero could be you. If you see or hear something that doesn't seem right, you can submit a confidential tip to OK2SAY. OK2SAY allows anyone to confidentially report tips on criminal activities or potential harm directed at Michigan students, school employees, or schools.

A Secret Service study found that in 81% of violent school incidents, someone other than the attacker had knowledge of the plan, but failed to report it because of fear or retaliation or being labeled a snitch. To eliminate that fear and help break the code of silence, the tipster's idenity is confidential.

Protect yourself and others by using OK2SAY. Because if you won't, who will?

DISTRICT MEDICATION POLICY



Many students are required to take medications (prescriptions and/or non-prescription) during the school day. There are specific policies adopted by the Ida Board of Education and the state that must be followed in these cases.

- All medications must be brought to the office by a parent and dispensed by the office staff only.
- Students are not allowed to have medications in their possession (to include lockers) or take medications without the supervision of the office staff.
- The medication must be in its original container and be accompanied by written instructions from the student's physician and parent. The required form for providing this information is available in the office.



Bus pickup times are the same as last year. Students are advised to be at their bus stop 3-5 minutes early.

Reminders for Students.


- Be courteous and cooperative with your driver

CURRICULUM CORNER



New Curriculum at Ida

After adoption at Curriculum Council and board approval, some students will be seeing new textbooks in the fall. The Middle School has purchased the Wonders ELA curriculum after a year of piloting the program for our 5th grade students. This program is a complete language arts program that incorporates reading, writing, grammar, and spelling while covering the ELA content standards with multiple resources for both teachers and students.

The Middle School also received new Saxon Math textbooks for our 6th and 7th grade students due to many errors present in the copies we purchased for the 2018-2019 school year. These replacement books were sent to us free of charge from the publisher. In addition to these textbooks, we also had some High School textbooks rebound and purchased some replacement books as needed at each building.

Students Show Growth on Standardized Assessments

Students and teachers worked very hard this past school year to achieve significant gains on our standardized assessments. The Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA), is used to show student growth with our K-8th grade students. All grade levels scored above the National Norm in both reading and math. STAR reading is also used in these grade levels to get a grade equivalent score. By the end of the year our students consistently have an average overall grade equivalent score higher than their grade level. Our community can be very proud of our Ida students on their academic achievement!

WOW! 22 YEARS OF "SAFETY CITY"

It is with pride that we announce the completion of Ida's 22nd consecutive "Safety City" program. The program was held June 18th through June 30th. Running for two hours per day, Safety City culminated with a picnic/ graduation on the last day. Completion certificates and many gifts were passed out at the event, which celebrated the graduation of 20 preschool and kindergarten children.



Free and Reduced Meal Price Applications

An application for free/reduced meals is avail-

able at each of the building offices or you may print the application from the Ida Public Schools website or pick one up in any of the buildings. PLEASE return the form prior to the first day of school by dropping the application off at a building office or at the Superintendent's office. The applications will be processed in advance so that your children will receive the benefits on the first day of school.

You can deposit money into your child's account by sending cash or a check, made payable to Ida Public Schools, with your student to school. You may send one check to be distributed amongst siblings, but please note how much money should be given to each child. You can also log into MySchoolBucks from the Ida Public Schools website. This allows you to make deposits to your child's account and view their account history.

Please make sure your child has money on their lunch account. The food service staff will only allow students to "charge" a lunch one time. Then your child is notified that they need to make a deposit to their account.

We look forward to serving your children a healthy breakfast and lunch at Ida Public Schools. 
