Course Rules:

- ✓ If you missed on a test or quiz day, it is your responsibility to make arrangements for test or quiz make-up. If you do not make arrangements to make these up, you will be unable to make up the test or quiz and it will count as a zero.
- ✓ If at all possible, try to do something at home that will help keep you on track to complete your week's work on time. Sometimes this will not be possible. Just do your best.
- ✓ If you are struggling to make-up missing work, talk to me or have a parent call me and we can work out the details. But, I can't help if I don't know.

Teacher Responsibilities

- Make all assignments and hybrid learning activities available in a timely manner.
- Be available at scheduled times to answer student/caregiver questions.
- Provide timely feedback on student work. Grades will be posted in Home Access Center upon completion of work. Grades will reflect test and quiz scores, accuracy of classwork/homework, completion of work, and engagement/effort of the student.
- Provide deeper instruction and support during in-person learning times
- Communicate regularly with students
- Provide a range of meaningful learning opportunities that meet the needs of all learners
- Provide regular feedback to students on progress related to learning activities.

UNITED STATES HISTORY I'm struggling to do well in class! What can I do?

It is likely that at one point or another during the year you will struggle with a lesson, assignment, project, or quite simply understanding the basics of a lesson or topic. Below is a list of ideas or strategies to consider if you reach that point.

1. Cornell Note EVERYTHING

In this class you will learn a quick and simple way to effectively take notes and organize your thoughts. This will be done by using the Cornell Method of Note-Taking. You should use Cornell Notes for all readings, lectures, film clips, and maybe even certain assessments. This will help you stay organized, structured, and focused when it is time to study.

2. Use Google Classroom every single day, multiple times a day:

The course website may be the single most useful tool to help you succeed in this class. Teacher notes, slideshows, videos, and other course materials will be available throughout the year. Furthermore, the class (tentative) schedule, opportunities for extra credit, and bonus review material will be posted.

3. Study!!!!!

This one should be obvious, but many students fail to understand the importance of studying. This class will emphasize critical thinking and a full understanding of concepts rather than simply recalling facts. In order to be prepared for tests and quizzes, you should study for a half-hour to 45 minutes MINIMUM. You should start by examining lesson vocabulary and work to gather your notes and reviews to understand the types of questions that may be asked and how the information fits together.

4. Watch available film clips or presentations 2 or 3 times before tests or quizzes.

As mentioned before, the majority of classroom film clips and presentations will be posted on the website, and many are available via simple Google search. Track them down and watch them again.

5. Do the Available Extra-Credit.

Extra credit opportunities won't always be simple questions or easy assignments. But they're impact on your grade can make a massive difference. Some form of extra credit is available each week. This can be one of the quickest ways to build your grade.

If you are doing the above things (No, really doing them—not just saying you are) and you're still struggling, set up a meeting with your teacher. Do not wait until the end of a semester to seek help! Monitor your grade early and often.
